### Club Spotlight: Kernersville Woman's Club

The Kernersville Woman's Club was founded in 1951. Currently, the club has 45 members and meets the 3rd Thursday of each month, from September through May at the Kernersville Community House.



The club awards three \$2000 scholarships to seniors from three local high schools.


Through the club's Conservation/Beautification Committee, club members work hand in hand with the Town of Kernersville maintaining flower beds at Harmon Park and the Kernersville Community House. The club also helps clean and decorate a local ceme-

tery, and decorates an outdoor tree at the Kernersville Museum, as well as volunteering at the Ciener Botanical Gardens.



As a club fundraiser, the Kernersville Woman's Club hosts the local Lion's Club two to three times a year by preparing and serving a meal. The club sells pecans and

specialty nuts during the fall as another fundraiser.



Each month the club collects feminine products to donate to Crisis Control Ministries.

Other organizations that the Kernersville Woman's Club supports are:

Kernersville Public Library, Shepherds Center, Crisis Control Hospital, Harmon Park, Town of





Kernersville, Kernersville Museum, local downtown businesses, Next Step Ministries, Domestic Violence Shelter, and local public schools. Check them out on <u>Facebook</u>.

## Club Spotlight: Woman's League of Mt. Airy

In 1996 members aging out of the Mt. Airy Junior Woman's Club formed the Women's League of Mt Airy and it was chartered in 1997 with 32 members. Last year the club celebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> year anniversary.



The club has a long history of supporting children and families in the Mt. Airy community. These efforts include work with various shelters, beautification projects throughout the community, and support of local museums. The club volunteers time and contributes financially to the local library and fire and police services. In the area of health, the club has conducted blood drives and assisted with drivethrough flu and Covid clinics. As a smaller club, the Women's League of Mt. Airy enjoys partnering with other organizations to create a larger impact.

Like most clubs, the Woman's League of Mt. Airy was challenged by the Pandemic. They had problems staying connected. When things became more safe, the club formed a social group of single and widowed members who met weekly for dinner and outings. This was so helpful keeping members from being isolated



and gave them the opportunity to invite outside friends to join and be introduced to the GFWC experience.

The club currently has 15 members and **Ruth McBride** serves as president. **Lisa Goodin** will take over this position in May. Check them out on <u>Facebook</u>.
